



AN INTERVIEW WITH THE NEW DIRECTOR, YVONNE MAZUREK

1. Congratulations on being appointed as Director of the Cemetery from 1 January 2023! You have been living in Italy for many years but when did you first learn of the Cemetery?

Twenty years ago when I was teaching art history full-time in Viterbo and the school regularly travelled to Rome. Because of the poets' tombs and the Latin epitaphs, the Literature and Latin teachers vied to bring groups to the Cemetery, while I led site visits to Rome's museums and archaeological sites. It was the bicentenary of the deaths of Keats and Shelley that brought my attention back to the Cemetery and allowed me to forge an intimate relationship to this very special place.

2. You have been 'shadowing' Amanda Thursfield for periods in November. What have been your first impressions of the job?

The garden is a constant source of inspiration, but the people I've met behind the scenes have impressed me most. Amanda Thursfield has directed this site with utmost skill and care towards its many stakeholders. The staff has impressed me with its enthusiasm, commitment, and competence. The volunteers are cornerstones of the Cemeteries' visitor services, and distinguish themselves for their passion and friendliness. The concession-holders are, of course, the soul of the Cemetery. I appreciate their warm welcome.

3. You were brought up in the United States and studied art history at the University of Chicago. What brought you to Italy?

Many things. As a child, I felt at home among Tarquinia's painted tombs and was drawn to Mediterranean cultures. As a young adult, I studied art history, married an Italian, and had my daughter here. These family ties kept me here, as did my work dedicated to Italy's heritage and history. I now consider this country my adopted home.

4. The cemetery is remarkable for the diversity of nationalities and religious faiths that the Director encounters. How do you think you can handle this aspect?

The Cemetery's diversity, inclusiveness and syncretism make this an especially relevant place in our polarized world. In 2015, while managing an educational project in France for Plum Village, one of the best-known Buddhist contemplative centres in the world, led by Zen Master Thich Nhat Hanh, I was asked to liaise with people in spiritual and secular roles from many paths. I believe that curiosity and humility are the foundations for intercultural dialogue and am looking forward to getting to know the many traditions that infuse our Cemetery.

5. In recent years you have specialised in heritage conservation and museums, completing a Ph.D on the town of Orte north of Rome. How do you think this experience will help you manage the Cemetery?

My doctoral research explored museum and conservation strategies for 'minor' Italian heritage, requiring research in museums, libraries, and a variety of archives. While I grappled with issues that may seem distant from this historic site, I believe the methods and skills I have gained will help me understand the complexity of this 300-year old site and the people who shaped it. I encourage further research into the lives of those



buried here and the international networks that brought them to Rome.

7. What do you consider the greatest challenges in managing the Cemetery's future?

I see two major challenges. The first we have little control over: climate change. We have yet to understand how irregular rainfall will impact our pines and cypresses over time, nor do we know how the garden's soil, plants and wildlife will evolve. The second challenge may seem minor by comparison, but involves the Cemetery's intangible heritage: its calm. For example, we invite visitors to limit the use of their electronic devices in the garden. While the internet is full of unapproved photographs of the Cemetery, it is our duty to concessionholders to preserve its contemplative atmosphere. I feel strongly about the value of this slow and 'unplugged' experience. As Director, I would like to find creative ways of nudging visitors off their cameras/ phones and into the 'live' experience of the site.

8. Any final word to the Friends as you start your job?

'The holiest place in Rome,' as Oscar Wilde described it, stays open to the public thanks to the generosity of daily visitors and Friends like you. Your donations directly finance conservation projects and your participation make this the special place it is. Thank you for your continued support!
